The Challenge



2 out of 3 Maine adults are **overweight or obese**

41%

of Maine children in grades 5 and 6 are **overweight or obese**



72% of adults in Maine **do not eat enough** fruits and vegetables

16%

of Maine households face **hunger/food insecurity**



1 in 4 children are **food insecure**

>> Helping Mainers shop, cook, and eat healthy foods on a limited budget




Introducing school children to **new fruits and vegetables** through classes and school gardens



Teaching low-income Mainers how to **buy and prepare healthy foods**



Helping SNAP families **stretch tight budgets** and buy healthy options



And...supporting sustainable community changes that help reduce the burden of obesity across Maine.

The Results

- » In 2016, **44** Nutrition Educators conducted **11,548** evidence-based nutrition education classes in all 16 counties reaching **34,190** low-income children and adults.
- » **80%** of classroom teachers reported more students now **choose fruits or vegetables** in the cafeteria or during classroom parties after participation in the SNAP-Ed Pick a better snack™ program.



- » Parents of children participating in the Pick a better snack™ program reported significant increases in their children requesting and consuming more fruits and vegetables.
- » **3,109** Mainers were taught skills to **shop for healthy foods** at grocery stores.
- » In 2015, Nutrition Educators reached a total of **7,118** Mainers with sustainable changes to nutrition policies and environments in child care settings, schools, afterschool programs, public housing, and community sites to help **make the healthy choice the easy choice**.
